We have put it off long enough, it's time that we put more efforts into a unified direction. The Hatch family is not a new organization, as many of you already know, the parent organization was established in 1914, and is one of the oldest continued organizations in the L.D.S. Church. We must not let this organization die. We must go forward and continue the work our forefathers started. There has been intensive research done in the past. The work is not complete. There are many new generations that have not been touched, on the living, and many lines that branch off from the Hatch line. Our records also need new copies made every so often so as to preserve this information for generations to come. If we can get this organization going good again, we can also work towards getting the records microfilmed or published in bound books.

It is going to take all the help we can get from members of this family organization. This means financially, any hours of time, and machinery you might have, to assist us. Remember we have over 100,000 names in our records, dating back to the dark ages. Our service and these records can be of great value to you. This organization is for all of us, not just a few.

We are making the first mailing of this News letter to 500 members of the Hatch family. The cost of this letter is around \$50.00 and many hours of time that has been given. Those of you who want to receive these Newsletters, which will be sent out every three (3) months, we must have your \$6.00 dues. For those who don't pay theirs will not be sent to them after the first mailing. We are printing extra copies of these letters and they will be available to anyone on request, or to new members, that may want them, for a small charge. These requests should be sent to the President.

MEMBERSHIP: One membership covers all members living in one household, i.e. Parents, Grandparents, children, husband and/or wife. Any member of the household is eligible to hold office. Membership not limited to Hatch descendants.

.DUES:

Six Dollars (\$6.00) Payable on or before reunion time. Checks are to be made out to the Hatch Family Organization, and or give to Glen Hatch Tolman, Sec. Treasurer or any other Officer in the Organization.

EXPENSES:

The Executive Committee will determine how the funds will be spent. Expenditures will be spent. Expenditures will

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include such things as Cost of Newsletters, printing new group sheets and pedigree charts, research, and

others. No member will receive remuneration for his or her services to the organization. A financial statement will be published once a year.

SERVICE CHARGES.

Charges for sheets and services will be as follows:

Group Sheets . . . \$1.00 per sheet
 Pedigree Charts . . . 1.00 per sheet
 Research Work . . . 1.50 per hour
 Minimum.

The charges on the Group sheets and pedigree charts will be 60 cents each to those members who have paid their yearly dues of \$6.00.

Research work is \$1.50 per hour to everyone, unless there is some added work which could make the charge higher.

THE ORGANIZATION WILL;

- a. Publish a newsletter once every (3) three months. Contents to be determined by the desires of the members. (including queries, family lines, biographical sketches of ancestors and/or members, results of individual research and by all means the results of the organization hired researcher .
- b. Advertise the Hatch Family Association in the annual family organization issue of the "Genealogical Helper".

AMENDMENTS TO BY LAWS:

These by-laws can be amended by a majority of the members. In this instance, each household is entitled to one vote. Officers will be elected each April on or about the sixth.

The Editor of the monthly newsletter must have access to a duplicating machine or printing machinery of some type. Let me remind you again as the organization grows, the paper, stencils or printing, postage, etc, for the newsletter will be no little expense. Let's get our DUES in immediately so we can get this rolling

2. Prepare your family group sheet and pedigree chart and send them in with your dues.

3. Prepare a list of the household that will be included in your membership.
4. Send us names of others, so we can send them a Newsletter, inviting them to join us or send their records to us to print them.
5. We will have a suggestion box at the Reunion, yearly, if you have any suggestions, which will add interest to our organization and newsletters. We want to hear from those of you, that won't possibly be able to attend these reunions because of the great distance of traveling.

We eventually want to have reproductions of pictures, reprints of our Coat of Arms (in color), to sell to those who want them. This all adds interest to your records.

We will hold a reunion each year in the summer, consisting of three branches—descendants of Ira Stearns Hatch, Jeremiah Hatch, and Jacob Hatch. These reunions have been held in the past. We have a very good place reserved this year. We extend a Special Invitation to all of you, to be here. Come and get acquainted with your relatives. The reunion will be held at the JORDAN PARK, "Large Bowery", Wednesday, July 21st 1965. Come early and bring anything of interest from your family records or histories that may be of interest to others of the family. Bring your own dinner. There will be a program, games, fun and a good time for all.

The Hatch Family In England:

Hatch is a name derived from an old Anglo Saxon word Hacche, meaning a door or floodgate, consisting of great stakes put up by fishermen to help in securing fish. Hacche is also a term for a bar across a woodland path to prevent deer escaping. If Henry


lived near a hacche, he would be called Henry atte hacche and finally Henry Hatch. And Richard atte Hacche and Phillip de la Hacche are names in old records. The name first appears in

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Domesday Book in the form of "Hache". "Hache also means a small ax among French speaking people.

"The Hatch (written differently 'Hacche; 'Hach") family were established as landowners in Devonshire at an early period. The Hatch family of Ardee Castle in County Louth, Ireland, have the same coat of arms as the Cornwall and Devonshire families.

Ira Stearns Hatch, born 9 February, 1800, Winchester, Cheshire County, New Hampshire, the son of Ira Hatch and Lucinda Rice; married January 26, 1824, in Farmersville, Cattaraugus County, New York, Wealtha Bradford. She was born November _ 1803, at Turner, Oxford County Maine, the daughter of Simeon Bradford and Martha True. Wealtha died 3 November 1841, burial at Eton Farm, Illinois. Ira Stearns died 30 September, 1869, burial at Bountiful, Utah. Ira Stearns Hatch had three other wives (2) Abigail Whitely (3) Jane Bee Mc Kechine (4) Jane Ann Stuart.


Ira Stearns Hatch and wife Wealtha, while living in state of New York, heard missionaries preaching gospel of Jesus Christ; the wife believed and read the Book of Mormon.

They decided to visit the Prophet in Kirtland. After a three day journey they arrived and was directed to place where Prophet Joseph was. As they approached the Prophet, he came toward them with out stretched hand and greeted them, with "Brother Hatch, I have waited three days for you, the money you bring will be used to build the pulpit of the temple. Ira Stearn's testimony stayed with him all his life.

Third child of Ira Sterns Hatch. Orin Hatch, born 9 May 1830, Farmersville, Catt., New York; married October 10 1855, in Salt Lake City, So Lake County, Utah (1) Elizabeth Melissa Perry. She was born Sept. 27, 1836, at Herfordshire, England, the daughter of John Perry and Grace Ann Williams. Elizabeth M. Perry died 30 Jan 1908, at Bountiful, Davis Co., Utah. Orin Hatch died 6 Sep. 1906, at Bountiful, Davis, Utah. Orin Hatch had one other wife (2) Maria Thompson.

This is the Hatch Coat of Arms or Achievement of arms.

In those days when knighthood was in flower, and heraldic devices were granted for heroism, or service, or rank or influence, many families had their Cost of Arms, a symbolic badge for the family, just as the flag is a symbol for our country. The rules



regarding these arms were very strictly regulated and enforced, and periodically heralds made official visitations to determine the right of various families to the coat of arms they displayed. Standard methods were used to denote marriages with heiresses, the use of arms by younger sons through the device of differencing and often a record was kept of the grants of arms. Should you trace back in unbroken line through either male or female descent, to the family possessing a coat of arms, you have the right to use that coat of arms as you see fit, as a family memorial, betokening the recognition which came to your family in the distant past. Family seals were also officially granted and these were often used in signing important documents. Frequently these seals have served an important purpose in adding in the identification of ancestors.

Because the information is available, we will give you a little information on the Fifth child of Ira Stearns Hatch and Wealtha Bradford.

Ira Hatch, born 5 August 1835, Farmersville, Catt. New York; md. 10 September 1859, Old Endowment House, Salt Lake City, Utah, (1) Amanda Melvina, Pace. She was born 11 September 1842, at Nauvoo, Hancock, Illinois the daughter of Elisha Pace and Eliza _____. Amanda M. Pace died 17 April 1861, at Bountiful, Davis, Utah. Ira Hatch died 30 Sep. 1909, at Fruitland, San Juan, New Mexico. Ira Hatch had two other wives (2) Sarah Maraboots (3) Nancy Julia Pipkin.

Ira Hatch and Amanda Melvina Pace had one child, Named:
